With 24 students, this year's Shakespeare Team is the largest Brighton High School has ever had. Each year Brighton Theatre holds auditions for students to join the team, which competes at the Utah Shakespeare Festival in Cedar City by acting out scenes from Shakespearean plays.

Nineteen of these team members rose to the top while performing minute-long Shakespeare monologues at auditions. During the auditions, Makayla Conner, Brighton's theater teacher, watched students perform their monologues and looked for those who were passionate and energetic. In addition to the 19 actors, five other students made the team for technical theater. These students will help behind the scenes to make the show great.

Ms. Conner explained how these students will not only learn Shakespearean acting, but they will also learn about hard work, patience, and teamwork. Some of the performances that we can expect to see from the team this year are a 10-minute piece from Shakespeare's Coriolanus, monologues from Henry IV part 2, Troilus and Cressida, and Henry VI part 3, as well as scenes from Henry VIII and Cymbeline.

Ms. Conner's biggest goal this year is to help the team constantly improve. She hopes that the team will learn and grow throughout this season. We are excited to see the performances from the team and wish them good luck at the Shakespeare Festival! *


